Helpful Information and Suggested Timeline

Note: The official Earth Day is April 22nd of each year. It might be wise to check out when surrounding parks are holding their specific celebrations of Earth Day and schedule yours on an open date.

Suggested Dates	Suggested tasks to take care of
January	<p>Invite volunteers from family, worship community, garden clubs, and ecologically-minded folks to help you plan Earth Day. Set a date that is convenient for everyone. Choose a date and time together as a group to plan the event at a nearby location such as a library, a place of worship or a public building.</p> <p>If you need financial resources, welcome a sponsoring group or business to cover costs, i.e. rental of a room, printing, refreshments, purchase/rental of a DVD, and honorarium for speaker, <i>as applicable if needed</i>.</p> <p>Contact a facility such as a library, a worship site, a civic center or even a restaurant for use of needed facilities.</p>
January/February	<p>As a committee, choose a theme and decide how you want to express it: a speaker? A panel? A film? A demonstration of some sort?</p> <p>Outline the program as you see it now and do this together, if possible</p> <p>Publicize in local paper/local newsletters</p> <p>Decide who will make flyer and how you will distribute these—online; copies can go to friends, neighbors, businesses, places of worship.</p> <p>Decide who will solicit volunteers to bake cookies. (These always help!)</p> <p>Together, as a committee, set the timeline for the day to include these items:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Prayerful reflection Introduction to film Film Discussion Social time; refreshments <p>Sample announcements are included in packet</p> <p>Sample flyers included in packet.</p> <p>Each volunteer could just bake 2 dozen cookies. Leftovers could lead to a cookie exchange!</p>
February	<p>Review tasks assigned to make sure all was taken care of and is in readiness for your March date.</p> <p>Make sure you have access to DVD equipment and that someone who is familiar with the machinery</p>

	<p>take care of running the film.</p> <p>Decide what time all of you will arrive on the day of the event</p> <p>Even if your group in attendance is anywhere from three to thirty, you are contributing to the positive energy for change on our planet, even if you don't see it.</p>
March	<p>Celebrate the event you held by having tea together as a committee or visiting a nearby nature center or...</p> <p>If participants like the event, invite them to form a group and possibly plan the next occasion. Inform them that you enjoyed the planning and that it was not difficult and did not take a lot of time from other areas of your life.</p>

Elm Grove Village Earth Day; April 27, 2014

If you ever doubted the magic of Monarch butterflies, and for that matter, bees and bats, too, then ask those who were present at our 2nd annual Elm Grove Village Earth Day just what they experienced. Not only children were enthralled by the home-grown story, the graceful dancing artist, Theresa Barnes, who mimed the transformation of a caterpillar into a butterfly; the clothespins and coffee filters crafted into butterflies but also the adults who watched the film, *The Incredible Journey of the Butterflies*. Thirty children and seventy-four adults were delighted by this event carefully-planned by Mary Ricklefs (EG Garden Club), Svetlana Foley (EG Library Director), Marni Geissler (SSND Associate) and Suzanne Moynihan (School Sister of Notre Dame). They were assisted by four volunteers from Brookfield Central High School Key Club, Diane Engelhart, SSND, photographer, and an SSND Associate.

The five presenters also sponsoring exhibit tables were: Barb Agnew (butterflies); Dr. John Whitcomb (bats); Denise Palkovich (bees), Meribeth Sullivan (green lawn care) and Sister Suzanne Moynihan (The EDGE/global warming). Participants heard intriguing stories about the habits of the three animals, what endangers them and how to welcome their presence into our backyards. Thanks to the library staff, the event was held at the Elm Grove Village Library.

**Earth Day Planning Committee Meeting
January 9, 2013**

1. Introductions: committee members share their name and what sparked their interest to join this committee and present an Earth Day program
2. Brainstorming: how can we best honor what has already been done in this area and yet raise awareness about actions that could be done personally, as a household, as a business or as a village?
 - a. What has already been done
 - b. Brainstorming: What would benefit the folks in our area? Worship community?
3. Possible Approaches
 - a. Hold celebration in one place with various groups having booths which emphasize green practices, indicating what organization/business does to be green; use Earth Day Songs; have poetry hearing; musical works...
 - b. Use a “green” practice in readiness for Earth Day and have businesses report on what they did; possible share a gift basket with winning business. These are some suggestions about what it is they could do:
 - Less is More** - Purchase items with less packaging.
 - Paperless Technologies** - Go paperless as much as possible
 - Go Chemical Free** – Examine chemical use in office/business and research alternatives
 - CFL Light Bulbs** – Convert conventional bulbs to CFL bulbs
 - Green Energy** – Measure your carbon footprint; resolve to change one habit this week
 - Recycling** – Start a recycling program at your school, office, workplace; research possibility of recycling containers used throughout the village.
 - Eco-Challenges** - Refrain...Reuse...Reduce...Recycle...Reinvent...
 - Sustainable Reading** – Provide books with information on how to reduce one’s carbon footprint; nature; climate change; endangered mammals and plants; nearby hiking trails;
 - Earth Day Movies**—sponsor a theater and invite citizens; purchase an ecological film and show during Earth Week
 - Green Transportation** – Walk, carpool or bike - Skip the car!
 - Plant a Tree or Garden** – Green your environment with trees, gardens and flowers; plant several trees in the park in honor of dignitaries (past or present).
 - Turn off the lights** – Turn off electronic equipment when not in use
 - Go Vegetarian** – Research menus and resolve to eat have one vegetarian day a week; hold Vegetarian Pot Luck during Earth Week

Hold An Art Fair: Construct creative artifacts from recycled materials: gum wrappers, toothbrushes, landfill goods

School Earth Week Activities – Invite schools to engage in Earth Week activities and to display these in a public place: business windows, library, village meeting hall...They could make posters, decorate paper grocery bags, do a video with an earth-centered theme. Maybe they would like to work in groups.

Conserve Resources: Encourage office employees, family members to conserve water: turn the faucet off when brushing teeth; turn the thermostat down two degrees; wash clothes only when there is a full load and in cold water; shorten showers; use water for more than one purpose; hang clothes on a line rather than using the dryer

Compost: nature's way of recycling decomposed organic materials into a rich soil. Compost can be used in gardens, flower beds

Rain Barrels/Rain Gardens: Hold teaching demonstration; have a rain barrel handy; have a corner in which a computer is set up with a You Tube video on how to set up a rain barrel

Solar/Wind Energy: Invite someone to share on benefits and costs

4. Benefits: When businesses go green, in addition to helping the Earth, they can often times get tax deductions or other financial benefits, so see if your companies or places of worship or organizations in your area are open to making some kind of an Earth Day commitment. EARTH STATIONS

A Prayer Recalling The Condition Of God's Body Earth

Percussion (rain stick, wind chime, shakers, drum) begins and at signal the Leaders, Readers, flag and candle bearers take places. When percussion ends, Leader 1 begins:

INTRODUCTION:

Leader 1: In the Preamble of the Earth Charter we read:

Reader 1:

We stand at a critical moment in Earth's history, a time when humanity must *choose* its future. As the world becomes increasingly interdependent and fragile, the future at once holds great peril and great promise. To move forward we must recognize that in the midst of a magnificent diversity of cultures and life forms, we are one human family and one Earth community with a common destiny.

Reader 2:

Humanity is part of a vast evolving universe. Earth, our home, is alive with a unique community of life. The forces of nature make existence a demanding and uncertain adventure, but Earth has provided the conditions essential to life's evolution. The resilience of the community of life and the well-being of humanity depend upon preserving a healthy biosphere with all its ecological systems, a rich variety of plants and animals, fertile soils, pure waters and clean air. The global environment, with its finite resources, is a common concern of all peoples. The protection of Earth's vitality, diversity and beauty is a sacred trust.

Leader 2:

And in an open letter of the National Council of Churches we hear:

Reader 1:

"To commit a crime against the natural world is a sin. For humans to cause species to become extinct and to destroy the biological diversity of God's creation ...for humans to degrade the integrity of Earth by causing changes in its climate, by stripping the Earth of its natural forests, or destroying its wetlands... for humans to injure other humans with disease... for humans to contaminate the Earth's waters, its lands, its air, and its life with poisonous substances ... these are sins." We have become un-Creators. Earth is in jeopardy at our hands.

Reader 2:

This means that ours is a theological crisis as well. We have listened to a false gospel ...one that proclaims that God cares for the salvation of humans only and that our human calling is to exploit Earth for our ends alone. This false gospel still finds its proud preachers and continues to capture adherents among emboldened political leaders and policy makers. The imperative first step is to repent of our sins, in the presence of God and one another.... We are a precious part of Earth's web of life, but we do not own the planet and we cannot transcend its requirements for regeneration on its own terms. We have not listened well to the Maker of Heaven and Earth – or to Earth itself.

Leader 1: Let us reflect together on the condition of God's creation.



The First Station: EARTH

Leader 1:

Earth is both the planet we live on and the matter we live from. Its thin skin of soil produces our food, nurtures our trees and plant life, cleans our water, protects us from floods and regulates our climate. Throughout the ages, soil has been regarded as precious, even sacred, because of its gifts. Yet, today we have degraded over 5 billion acres of soil globally - through chemical fertilizers and pesticides, unregulated waste dumping, over-farming and over-grazing, deforestation, excessive population growth, and polluted rain. Replacing the topsoil already lost will take centuries -- even millennia. And so we pray....

Side 1

We ask forgiveness for:

- using unnatural pesticides and fertilizers,
- straining the soil by eating too high on the food chain,
- dumping recyclable waste in landfills.

Side 2

We are grateful for the gifts soil shares:

- plants and trees to help Earth breathe,
- food and medicines for us and all creatures,
- ground to root us in Earth.

Leader 1 Let us be still and imagine our feet reaching through the layers of flooring to the Earth beneath us. Sense the soil there - alive with microorganisms, solid and sustaining.



The Second Station: AIR

Leader 2:

Air – the invisible force that surrounds us, fills us up and gives us life. Air is the moving ocean of gases in which we swim all the days of our lives. Invisible and indivisible, air is a place without borders or owners, shared by all life on Earth. Air binds us all together as a single living entity extending through time and space. But human pollution is now rapidly changing Earth’s air – filling it with materials harmful to all beings. These substances rise into the atmosphere damaging the ozone layer, increasing the planet’s temperature, and endangering the health of the most vulnerable, then fall back to Earth as acid rain - killing forests and

sterilizing lakes. And so we pray....

Side 2

We ask forgiveness for:

- spewing chemicals and fossil fuel wastes into the atmosphere,
- exposing millions of children to life-threatening pollution, and
- taking clean, fresh air for granted.

Side 1

We are grateful for the gifts air shares:

- oxygen to keep us alive,
- space where we and other creatures can live,
- means for birds to fly and sound to travel.

Leader 2: Let us be still and attend to our own breathing, mindful of our absolute dependence on air.



The Third Station: ANIMALS:

Leader 1:

Our lives and livelihoods depend on biodiversity – the wealth of wild species. But Earth stands on the edge of a sixth “Great Extinction,” one caused largely by human activities. One quarter of Earth’s mammals, 12 percent of all birds, and 30 percent of all fish are at risk. This massive loss of species will be stopped only if we humans remember that nature is not an object to be exploited or an enemy to be destroyed, but an ally deserving respect and replenishment. We are part of the web of life. Many strands of this web have already been broken; we must act quickly to repair what we can. Our lives, and Earth as we know it, depend on this. And so we pray....

Side 1

We ask forgiveness for:

- destroying habitats of wild animals, most often for profit’s sake,
- ignoring animals’ most basic needs,
- raising animals in inhumane ways.

Side 2

We are grateful for the gifts the animals share:

- an innate sense for living in balance,
- spirited energy and graceful beauty,
- playful spirits that make us laugh and help us relax.



The Fourth Station: WATER:

Leader 2:

Water is the wellspring of life, perhaps our most fragile and precious resource. But Earth's freshwater is under siege. Humans are manipulating, polluting, and depleting freshwater supplies at alarming rates. An estimated 1.2 million people already lack access to clean drinking water. Yet 90 percent of the planet's fresh water goes to inefficient agribusiness and other industrial use. If present patterns continue, two out of every three persons on Earth will live in water-stressed areas within 25 years. We have a special obligation to protect this vital resource for humans and other life forms. And so we pray....

Side 2

We ask forgiveness for:

- using more than our share of Earth's waters – depriving other species,
- destroying water's pristine quality and beauty,
- failing to ensure clean, affordable water for all people.

Side 1

We are grateful for the gifts water shares:

- its power to cleanse and refresh,
- its generous quenching of thirst,
- the calming magic of its rippling.

Leader 2: Let us listen attentively to the sounds of water, allowing it to still our spirits.



The Fifth Station: FIRE

Leader 1:

All life on Earth is forged in the fires of the sun and, throughout the ages, humans have revered flame as sacred power. But fire is a double-edged sword: what warms may burn; what unleashes energy may destroy. Humans are "fire creatures" – the species that manipulates fire. And our choice to burn fossil fuels now threatens all life on Earth. Carbon dioxide and other "greenhouse gases" are more than 25 percent higher than at any time in the last 160,000 years. Their accumulation is heating the planet - changing the climate in ways that will devastate ecosystems, disrupt weather patterns, and diminish harvests. And so we pray....

Side 1

We ask forgiveness for:

- continuing to rely on fossil fuels,
- using energy extravagantly,
- failing to insist on an eco-friendly economy.

Side 2

We are grateful for the gifts fire shares:

- heat to warm our homes and cook our meals,
- light to grow our food and illumine our lives,
- leaping flames to teach us to dance.

Leader 1: Let us reach out to the flame and draw its energy and power to ourselves.

CONCLUSION:

Leader 2:

Our first step is to repent of our sins; the second is to pursue a new journey together, with courage and joy. By God's grace, all things are made new. We can share in that renewal by clinging to God's promise ...and walking a path different from our present course. To that end, we affirm our faith.

Side 1

We stand with awe and gratitude as members of God's bountiful and good creation. We rejoice in the splendor and mystery of countless species, and the interdependence of all that God makes. We believe that Earth is home for all.

Side 2

We believe that, in boundless love that hungers and thirsts for justice, God incarnate affirms all creation.

Side 1

We believe that the created world is sacred – a revelation of God's power and gracious presence filling all things.

Side 2

We believe that the Holy Spirit, who animates all of creation, breathes in us and can empower us to participate in working toward the flourishing of Earth's community of life. We believe that the people of God are called to forge ways of being human that enable socially just and ecologically sustainable communities to flourish for generations to come.

All: Together, we look forward to the day when the groans of creation will be over, justice with peace will reign, humankind will nurture Earth, and all of creation will dance for joy! Amen!

Sample Introduction of Speakers and Program

Earth Day Introduction

Today, we proudly share with you a very fine film on butterflies and four knowledgeable and enthusiastic presenters. But first of all, let me introduce you to the committee:

- **Marni Geissler** is from the Milwaukee Organic Gardening Club and quite knowledgeable in square foot gardening; she is also a professional story-teller who will spin your kids a colorful yarn about bees.

Also, she is educated and experienced in agriculture. Understandably, gardening is a passion of hers and her garden is where you'll find her much of the time. Sister Jan Gregorcich, one of our own sisters, and of whom we are very proud, has been a member of the international community of the School Sisters of Notre Dame. For 46 years she served as a teacher, pastoral minister, missionary and is presently the executive director of Global Partners: Running Water, Inc.

Our personal experiences drive us to do what we do, awakening a passion which lies within us. And that is what happened to Sister Jan. During her 12 years in Guatemala she experienced water scarcity and its effects. As a result, in the aftermath of hurricane Mitch, our SSND leadership invited her to use her background and experience by developing a special project which came to be known as Global Partners: Running Waters, Inc. whose mission it is to build relationships through collaboration on water, food and health projects in Latin America. And from coming to know her, I can tell you that bonding with people is a priority with Sister Jan. Her efforts have resulted in the completion of more than 100 projects in Latin America since 2003.

With gratitude in our hearts, let's welcome Sister Jan.

Water, flooding, drought, climate change: these were all mentioned by President Obama in his State of the Union speech on January 28, 2014. Usually, we only hear about roads and bridges when we talk about infrastructure. Thankfully, the President has expanded this discussion by drawing the strong connection between water projects, jobs, and national vitality. If you delve deeper, you will see that:

- **One-fifth** of the U.S. economy – from agriculture, to mining, manufacturing, and electricity – would grind to a halt without a reliable and clean supply of water.
- An estimated **\$4.8 trillion** in capital investment over the next 20 years is needed to bring water and wastewater systems to a state of good repair and maintain current levels of drinking water service in the United States.
- An investment of \$1 billion in water infrastructure yields over **26,000 jobs** nationwide.
- The Department of Commerce estimates that each job created in the water and wastewater industry at the local level contributes **3.68 jobs** in the national economy.
- Each public dollar spent yields **\$2.62** dollars in economic output in other industries nationwide.
- By 2020, almost **700,000 jobs** will be threatened and \$416 billion in national GDP will be lost if water and wastewater infrastructure needs are not addressed.
- **Ninety-eight percent** of infrastructure investments for water and sewer are paid by local public agencies and their ratepayers.
