(Baltimore—December 11, 2014) School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) Atlantic-Midwest Province approved a corporate stance on comprehensive immigration reform legislation for the United States on December 8, 2014, during the Provincial Assembly of the Atlantic-Midwest Province held in Wilton, Conn.

"As the Atlantic-Midwest Province we have overwhelmingly voted a corporate commitment to comprehensive immigration reform for the United States," states Provincial Kathleen Cornell, SSND.

"While the recent executive action of President Obama will provide temporary relief to millions of immigrants living in the United States, the sisters will continue to urge Congress to pass bipartisan immigration legislation that is more comprehensive in its approach to U.S. immigration, will reflect the values of human rights and dignity, and will recognize the significant contributions of immigrants to the United States," she continued.

The corporate stance states:

- Pathways to citizenship for undocumented persons living in the United States
- Family reunification as a priority in immigration policy
- Opportunities and protections for low-skilled immigrant workers in the United States
- Due process protections within our immigration enforcement policies
- Addressing the root causes of migration such as global, economic, environmental and social injustices
- Effective and human border security that recognizes the human rights of all people.

The history of the School Sisters of Notre Dame in the United States and Canada is inextricably connected to the immigrant experience. Sister Caroline Friess, SSND, an immigrant from Bavaria, and the sisters who subsequently joined in her mission, contributed to the development of the United States

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by building and staffing schools. Caroline opened over 200 schools for settlers and pioneers, boys and girls mainly of immigrant families. Like these sisters, we believe that immigrants are vital contributors to U.S. and Canadian society and are entitled to the opportunity to develop their lives and contribute to their nation as they are able.
