- As we begin this time of prayer, let us prepare for some forms of life we might find challenging to love-
--the small crawling and flying creatures. name some $\qquad$

Science tells us that insects were here long before humans (more than 290 million years before) and that they have a very good chance of being here long after humans. Science and religion together tell us that all of creation is interwoven, interdependent and that we would do well to respect all life forms whether or not they obviously contribute to our pleasure. Indeed, the

Earth Charter calls us to respect these life forms (if not necessarily to love):

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in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures.

Even creatures we consider pests have their special place.
The praying mantis was chosen by Stone Age African hunters as the highest representation of value and meaning or
"the voice of the infinite in the small."

- Let us light the larger candle to represent the Divine Infinite present in the primordial flaring forth 13 billion years ago.
-. . Now let us light the smaller candle to represent the voice of the Infinite, the Holy Triune God in these small creatures, insects, that appeared 395 million years ago.
... A balance of nature depends on allowing all creatures to play their parts. Flies and mosquitoes pollinate wild flowers and are themselves a food source for frogs, bats, and fish. Beetles (ladybugs) eat aphids. Ants help peonies to bloom.
- . . . We are generally more favorably inclined toward bees, especially honeybees, than toward other insects. In early Christian symbolism, bees symbolized resurrec- tion and immortality. They disappear into the darkness of the hive in the winter and reappear in the spring. Honey has been considered a powerful and mystical substance, representing both wisdom and sweetness. The little bee, in cooperation with many other little bees, makes this great treat of honey possible.
