Discerning next steps

Sometimes in the process of discernment, we can get stuck in "analysis paralysis!" There comes a point at which we have learned what we can, we have discerned to the best of our ability, and yet we find ourselves still unable to take a next step. We may feel we don't yet have all the information needed, or maybe the timing just doesn't feel right. It's important to pay attention to those nudges, and to keep praying and discerning. But it's also important to remember God's faithfulness, and consider whether perhaps taking a next step might help to bring more clarity and give us what is needed to continue a good discernment.

Following is a reflection by Sister Kathy Knipper, OSF, from a booklet by LCWR, entitled: *Embracing a Traveler's Heart*. May her reflection (slightly adapted) be a source of inspiration for your own faith journey, especially when struggling with a "next step!"

Love the Questions¹



For years I have treasured Rilke's wisdom: "Love the questions...slowly you will live your way into the answers."

It takes a mountain of courage to journey through the unknown while believing God accompanies us in the gradual unfolding.

Trusting that God is in our questions, we make the path by walking with our sisters, learning and sharing insights as we discern the way forward. If we could see the whole journey, we might never undertake it. We dare the first step that takes us from the place we have known toward the place we do not know. There is nothing, but to truly be present, go for it, and be faithful.

We are called to heed the signposts of faith, intuition, and wisdom. Together with our sisters, we stay on the path and live ... with integrity and hope. When we risk ... God takes us to where we need to go – we live our way into answers.

Again and again, as I learn to trust the questions, the unfolding process for answers gradually evolves.

Reflection:

- How are you inspired to take first steps?
- What signposts have you experienced?
- What is gradually unfolding in you?
